

Climate Stewards Training

October 6-November 3, 2011



Our global climate is changing and there is scientific consensus that human emissions of greenhouse gasses are driving these changes at unprecedented rates. We are already seeing environmental changes in the Pacific Northwest. Climate change impacts have serious ramifications for our environment, economy, and the health of all species, including ours.

Climate Stewards are trained volunteers who work with their local communities to educate their neighbors about climate change and show how simple changes in our lives can make huge differences.

Climate Stewards receive 22 hours of FREE professional training:

- Become familiar with the science of climate change and local impacts of global warming.
- Discuss wise choices for living more sustainably in a warming and changing world.
- Learn how to communicate confidently and accurately about climate change.
- Meet new friends and join a community of concerned citizens - be a part of the solution.

In exchange, participants return at least 22 hours of volunteer service, engaging in climate change outreach and projects in their community.

Climate change may seem a daunting challenge, but because each of us contributes to the problem, we can be a part of the solution!
